## About the College

Moran College, one of the premier institutions of higher education in Upper Assam, was established in 1964 with the objective of extending quality higher education to learners from all sections of the society. Located in Moranhat town of Charaideo District, Assam, the college has grown steadily as a centre of academic excellence. Beginning with the Arts stream in 1964, the institution expanded with BA Honours courses in 1982, introduced the Science stream with general degree courses in 1990, and later Honours courses in Science in 1999.

Affiliated to Dibrugarh University, Moran College currently offers a wide range of undergraduate programmes in Arts and Science along with certificate and skill-based courses, ensuring holistic academic development. Over the years, it has developed into a vibrant academic hub with 15 departments, supported by dedicated faculty and a strong student community, and continues to contribute significantly to education, research, and community engagement in the region.

The college also extends learning opportunities through Open and Distance Learning (ODL) by hosting study centres of Krishna Kanta Handique State Open University (KKHSOU) and the Directorate of Open and Distance Learning (DODL), catering to learners seeking flexible modes of higher education.

# Campus Facilities

## Moran College Central Library

The library of Moran College houses a total collection of 34,458 books and serves as a vital academic resource for both students and faculty members. It subscribes to 3 magazines and 6 daily newspapers, ensuring access to current information and diverse reading materials. The library provides a seating capacity of 100 users, offering a comfortable and conducive environment for study and research.

In addition to its physical resources, the library offers access to over 30,000 e-journals through the One Nation One Subscription (ONOS) initiative, significantly enhancing research opportunities. Users can also download more than 1,000 PDF books for academic purposes.

The library is fully automated using *Koha*, an open-source library management software, which streamlines its operations. Furthermore, users can conveniently search and access the library's collection through the Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC), making information retrieval efficient and user-friendly.

## Auditorium

The auditorium of Moran College is a spacious and well-equipped venue with a seating capacity of around 1000 students. It features a large stage and serves as a central hub for hosting cultural programmes, seminars, meetings, and various academic and co-curricular activities throughout the year.

# Campus Facilities

## Laboratory facility

Moran College has well equipped laboratory facilities that support both practical learning and research across Arts and Science streams. In the Arts faculty, departments such as Geography and Education are provided with dedicated laboratories. The Geography laboratory is furnished with maps, surveying instruments and other essential tools that enable students to gain hands-on experience in cartography and field-based studies. The Psychology laboratory of the Department of Education is equipped with various testing materials and apparatus to help students understand psychological experiments and assessment techniques in a practical manner.

In the Science stream, the college has fully functional laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Botany, and Zoology. These laboratories are designed to meet the academic requirements of undergraduate courses and are equipped with modern instruments, specimens, chemicals and experimental setups. Students are encouraged to carry out experiments, projects and practical work under the guidance of experienced faculty members.

Additionally, the Department of Computer Science is supported by a well-maintained computer laboratory with adequate systems.



# Campus Facilities

## Shilpa Kala Sangrahalaya

Moran College houses a unique Shilpa Kala Sangrahalaya with a remarkable collection of 3011 rare evergreen gramophone records along with several gramophone record players. Maintained within the college library, the museum is accessible to students as well as visitors, offering them an opportunity to explore and appreciate vintage music and audio heritage. The museum also preserves a valuable collection of traditional Assamese household articles, agricultural tools, bamboo and cane crafts, indigenous musical instruments, and ethnographic materials reflecting the rich cultural heritage of Assam.

## Indoor Stadium

Moran College has a well-developed Indoor Stadium, constructed with financial assistance from the University Grants Commission (UGC). The facility is used for regular training and practice in indoor sports such as badminton and table tennis. Provision is also made for games like Arm wrestling, carrom, with guidance from instructors and part-time coaches to nurture students' skills.

## Swimming Pool

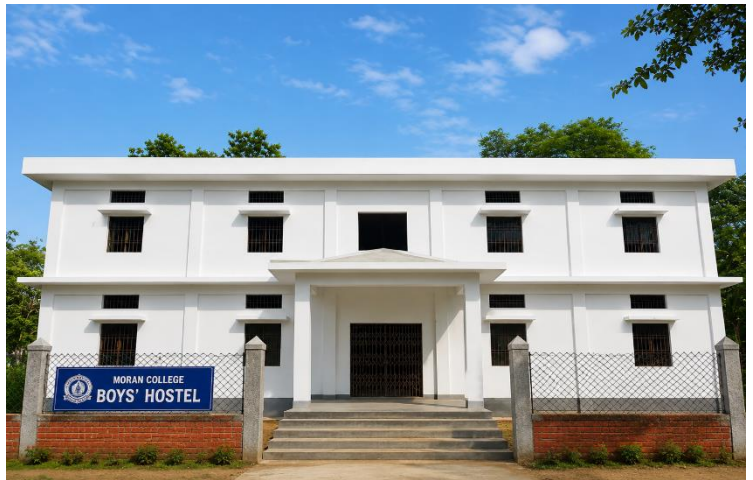
Moran College has a well-maintained swimming pool measuring approximately 50.00 m × 21.00 m × 1.80 m, providing facilities for both students and outsiders. The college also offers a certificate course in swimming, which is conducted regularly to promote physical fitness and skill development. Qualified coordinators and supporting staff supervise the training and activities, ensuring proper guidance and safety for participants.

## Hostel Facilities

The college provides separate hostel facilities for both girls and boys, located within the campus. As seats are limited, accommodation is offered primarily on the basis of merit and the distance of the student's residence from the college. Admission to the hostels is made through prescribed application forms submitted to the respective superintendents. The hostels are intended for disciplined students, and their admission and conduct are strictly governed by the Moran College Hostel Rules, copies of which are available in the hostel office.

# Eligibility Criteria & Academic Framework of Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) under NEP 2020

The Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) is implemented in accordance with the provisions of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, offering flexibility, multidisciplinary learning, and multiple entry and exit options. The programme is designed to provide holistic education with academic mobility and skill development opportunities.

## 1. Minimum Eligibility Criteria for Admission

(i). Candidates seeking admission into the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme must have passed the Higher Secondary (Class XII) Examination or equivalent from a recognized Board/Council.

(ii). Admission shall be conducted in accordance with:

- Guidelines issued by the Government of Assam
- Regulations of the affiliating University
- Norms prescribed under the SAMARTH Admission Portal

## 2. Multiple Entry and Exit Options of the Programme

In accordance with NEP 2020, the FYUGP provides flexibility for students to exit and re-enter the programme at different stages. The structure is as follows:

### a. First Year (After completion of 2 Semesters)

A student who successfully completes the first year of the programme shall be eligible for:

- Undergraduate Certificate
- The student may choose to exit the programme or continue to the second year.

### b. Second Year (After completion of 4 Semesters)

A student who successfully completes two years of the programme shall be eligible for:

- Undergraduate Diploma
- The student may either exit with the diploma or continue to the third year.

### c. Third Year (After completion of 6 Semesters)

A student who successfully completes three years of the programme shall be awarded:

- Bachelor's Degree
- The student may either exit with the degree or continue to the fourth year for advanced specialization.

### d. Fourth Year (After completion of 8 Semesters)

#### i. Bachelor's Degree with Honours

A student completing the fourth year shall be awarded:

- **Bachelor's Degree with Honours**
- This stage provides advanced disciplinary knowledge and specialization.

#### ii. Bachelor's Degree with Honours and Research

A student who:

- Secures the required academic performance (as prescribed by the University), and
- Successfully completes a Research Project/Dissertation shall be awarded:
- **Bachelor's Degree with Honours and Research**

## 3. Lateral Entry and Re-entry Provisions

- Students exiting the programme at any stage may be permitted to re-enter the programme within the stipulated period as per University rules.
- The re-entry shall be facilitated through the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) mechanism, enabling accumulation and transfer of credits.

**Course Structure:**

1. The Course Structure of the Undergraduate Academic Programmes as per the Programme The nature of the Courses for all Under Graduate Academic programmes shall be as below:

Sl. No	Category of the Course	Course	Description
1	Major Discipline: Major discipline provides the opportunity for a student to pursue in-depth study of a particular subject or discipline	Major discipline (Core)	Major discipline is the main focus area of study and the degree shall be awarded in that discipline. Students are required to earn the prescribed number of credits (approximately 50% of total credits) through courses of the major discipline.
2	Minor Discipline: Students who take a sufficient number of courses in a discipline or interdisciplinary area of study other than the chosen major will qualify for a minor in that discipline. The Minor Discipline can also be considered as a Double Major on accumulation of additional credits as per University regulations.	Minor / 2nd Major Discipline	Minor discipline enables students to gain broader understanding beyond their major discipline. In case of Double Major selection, the Minor discipline may be treated as the second major. Students opting for Double Major may be required to earn additional credits as prescribed by the University. Double major option shall be offered as per University provisions and institutional discretion.
3	Multi-Disciplinary Generic Elective: All UG students are required to undergo introductory level courses relating to any of the broad disciplines. These courses are intended to broaden the intellectual experiences and form part of liberal arts and science education. However, students shall not be allowed to choose or repeat any of these courses already undergone at the Higher Secondary level (12th class) and the discipline which he/she has chosen as Major.	Multi-Disciplinary Generic Elective – Natural Sciences	Introductory courses on Natural Sciences to be chosen from a basket of courses including Astronomy and Astrophysics, Biology, Biochemistry, Chemistry, Computer Science, Data Science, Earth and Atmospheric Sciences, Physics, Statistics, etc. Each Department/Centre shall offer GEC.
		Multi-Disciplinary Generic Elective – Social Sciences	Introductory courses on Social Sciences to be chosen from a basket of courses including Economics, Education, History, Linguistics, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Social Work, Communication and Media, etc. Each Department/Centre shall offer GEC.
		Multi-Disciplinary Generic Elective – Humanities	Introductory courses on Humanities to be chosen from a basket of courses including Archaeology, Arts and Creative Expressions, Comparative Literature, Creative Writing and Literature, Philosophy, etc. Each Department/Centre shall offer GEC.

4	Ability Enhancement Courses: These courses aim at enabling the students to acquire and demonstrate core linguistic skills, including critical reading, expository and academic writing skills.	Language (MIL/Regional Language)	Students are required to achieve competency in the use of a MIL or Regional Language. All language disciplines except English shall offer Language Courses.
		Language and Communication Skills (English)	Students are required to achieve competency in the use of English language with special emphasis on language and communication skills. Department of English shall offer this course.
		Mathematical and Computational Thinking and Analysis	Courses relating to Mathematical and Computational Thinking and Analysis would focus primarily on the mathematical and statistical tools used to support the study of natural and social sciences, including subject areas such as astronomy, biology, chemistry, economics, the environment, geological sciences, physics, and sociology etc. These courses would focus on the methodology used to analyze quantitative information to make decisions, judgments, and predictions, including defining a problem by means of numerical or geometrical representations of real-world phenomena, determining how to solve it, deducing inferences, formulating alternatives, and predicting cause and effect relationships. The goal is to ensure that students achieve a level of proficiency in using and analyzing quantitative information.
5	Value Added Course 2: The courses aim to enable the students to acquire and demonstrate certain values	Health and Wellness	The Course components relating to Health and Wellness seek to promote an optimal state of physical, emotional, intellectual, social, spiritual and environmental wellbeing of a person.
		Yoga	Yoga, Sports and Fitness activities will be organized outside the regular institutional working hours.
		Environmental Education /Science	The course seeks to equip students with the ability to apply the acquired knowledge, skills, attitudes, and values required to take appropriate actions for mitigating the effects of environmental degradation, climate change and conservation of biological diversity, management of biological resources, forest and wildlife conservation, and sustainable development and living. There shall be more emphasis on community-based activities.
		Digital and Technological Solutions/Digital Fluency	Courses in cutting-edge areas that are fast gaining prominence such as Artificial Intelligence (AI), 3-D machining, big data analysis, and machine learning with important applications to health, environment, and sustainable living that will be woven into undergraduate education for enhancing the employability of the youth.
		Understanding India	The course aims at enabling the students to acquire and demonstrate the knowledge and understanding of contemporary India with its historical perspective, the basic framework of the goals and policies of national development, and the constitutional obligations with special emphasis on constitutional values and fundamental rights and duties. The course would also focus on developing an understanding among student-teachers of the Indian knowledge systems, Indian education system and the roles and obligations of teachers to the nation in general and to the school /community/society, specifically.

6	Skill Enhancement courses: These courses are aimed at imparting practical skills, hands on training, soft skills etc. to enhance the employability of the students.	The institution may design courses as per the students' needs and available institutional resources subject to approval of the Dibrugarh University.
7	Community engagement (NSS/Adult Education/Student mentoring/NGO/Govt. institutions, etc.):	The curricular component of 'community engagement and service' seeks to expose students to the socio-economic issues in society so that the theoretical learning can be supplemented by actual life experiences to generate solutions to real-life problems. This component will include participation in activities related to National Service Scheme (NSS), National Cadet Corps (NCC), adult education/literacy initiatives and mentoring school students and other community works.
8	Field based learning/project	The field-based learning/project will attempt to provide opportunities for students to understand the different socio-economic contexts. It will aim at giving students exposure to development-related issues in rural and urban settings. It will provide opportunities for students to observe situation in rural and urban contexts, and to observe and study actual field situations regarding issues related to socio-economic development. Students will be given opportunities to gain a first-hand understanding of the policies, regulations, organizational structures, processes, and programmes that guide the development process.
9	Internship	Students will be provided with opportunities for internships with local industry, businesses, artists, crafts persons, etc. so that they may actively engage with the practical side of their learning and, as a by-product, further improve their employability.

NB: In case a student earns extra credit from an online course in lieu of a course which is offered with less credit in offline mode, the SGPA/CGPA will be calculated on the basis of the credits of the offline course. The remaining extra credit will be reflected in the Grade sheet.
12	Value added Add on courses	Students may be permitted to take Add on course(s) of their choice offered by the Dibrugarh University. The Add on course(s) will be reflected in the grade sheet but will not be taken in to account for computation of SGPA and CGPA.

2. A Course may also take the form of a Dissertation/ Project work/ Practical training/ Fieldwork/Internship, etc.

3. A student shall have to study the academic programme as per the scheme of the Programme. Even if a candidate earns the required number of credits before completion of the full duration of the programme, he/she shall not be entitled for the degree.

### **Course Enrolment**

1. The minimum and maximum credits to be opted by a student for qualifying of a Undergraduate programme shall be as per the Course Structure - Single Major and Double Major.

2. **Change in Major:** Students shall be allowed to change the Major at the end of the second semester. In such a case the Minor will be converted as the Major so that the credit earned by the student remains the same. In such case the earlier Major discipline in the 1st and 2nd semester will be treated as Minor discipline. The HEIs may create 10% additional seats over and above the sanctioned strength to accommodate the request for a change of major.

3. **Change in Minor:** Students shall be allowed to change Minor courses of his/her areas of interest within the broad discipline at the end of the third semester. If a student pursuing a major obtains a minimum of 12 credits from another course then the student will be awarded Bachelor degree in previous with a minor in later.

### **Attendance**

1. The Course Teacher shall be responsible for maintaining a record of attendance of students who have enrolled for the course.

2. All Course Teachers shall intimate the Principal through the Head of the Department concerned at least thirty calendar days before the last instruction day in the semester, the particulars of all students who have less than 75% of attendance during the total number of class days.

3. A student who has less than 75% attendance in average shall not be permitted to sit for the End semester examination. However, that it shall be open to the University to grant exemption to a student who has attended a minimum of 70% classes but failed to obtain the prescribed 75% attendance for valid reasons, on recommendation of the Principals of the College on payment of a prescribed fee(s).

4. The Principals of the Colleges shall announce the names of all students who shall not be eligible to take the End-semester examinations in the various Programmes and send a copy of the same to the Controller of Examinations. Such candidates shall have to repeat the concerned Course(s) when it is offered next.

5. A student declared as dis-collegiate shall not be allowed to proceed to the next higher Semester. He/she shall need to pursue the Semester afresh in which he/she was declared as dis-collegiate along with the next fresh batch.

### **Provision of Multiple Exit:**

**Exit 1:** There is a provision of exit after successful completion of 1 year (two semesters). A Certificate will be awarded when a student exits at the end of year 1 (2 semesters). Students who have secured minimum

of 40 credits will be awarded a UG certificate (in the field of study/discipline) if, in addition, they complete one work based/skill based vocational course/internship of 4 credits within one year from the completion of 2nd semester examination.

**Exit 2:** There is a provision of exit after successful completion of 2 years (four semesters). A Diploma will be awarded when a student exits at the end of year 2 (4 semesters). Students who have secured minimum of 80 credits will be awarded a UG Diploma (in the field of study/discipline) if, in addition, they complete one work based/skill based vocational course/internship of 4 credits within one year from the completion of 4th Semester examination.

**Exit 3:** Three Year UG Degree Programme (BA, B. Sc, B. Com and Bachelor in other discipline) with single/double major: There is a provision of exit after successful completion of 3 years (six semesters). Students who wish to undergo a 3-year UG programme shall be awarded UG degree in the major discipline after successful completion of three years, securing 120 credits.

**Four Year UG Programme with Honours (BA, B.Sc., B. Com and Bachelor in other discipline) with single/double major:** Students who wish to undergo a 4-year (8 semester) UG programme shall be awarded UG Honours degree in the major discipline after successful completion of four years with Discipline Specific Elective Courses in 7th and 8th semesters in lieu of Research Project and Dissertation, securing a minimum of 160 credits.

**Four Year UG Programme with Honours with Research (BA, B.Sc., and Bachelor in other discipline) with single/double major:** Students who wish to undergo a 4-year (8 semester) UG programme shall be awarded UG Honours with Research degree in the major discipline after successful completion of four years, with Research Project and Dissertation in 7th and 8th Semesters, securing 160 credits.

**Shaping the Future Through Research, Innovation, and Global Engagement at Moran College**

**Design Patent received for Animal-Friendly Research Apparatus**  
Dr. Bahita Gogoi, Assistant Professor in the Department of Zoology at Moran College, has been awarded a design patent for an innovative "Modular Animal Observation and Containment Apparatus" by the Patent Office, Government of India. The patent, granted on April 1, 2025, recognizes the collaborative effort of Dr. Gogoi and his team members—Professor Dr. Rinita Ahmed, Mr. Bhargav Borah, Mr. Pranab Kumar Das, and Mr. Abhishek Jibai. The newly patented apparatus stands out for its distinctive external design, modular configuration, and adaptable visual arrangement. These features enable flexible assembly while ensuring a non-intrusive and animal-friendly structure. The design is particularly aimed at improving ethical standards in wildlife and veterinary research. Speaking about the innovation, sources from the institution noted that the apparatus aligns with the growing global emphasis on humane and ethical research practices. Its modular nature allows researchers to customize setups according to specific study requirements without compromising the comfort and safety of animals. The achievement marks a significant milestone for Moran College, highlighting its contributions to research and innovation in zoology and animal welfare.

**Design patent for "Smart Education Kiosk Device"**  
Mrs. Joydanta Kaman, Associate Professor, Department of Education, Moran College, has been awarded a design patent for a "Smart Education Kiosk Device" by the Patent Office, Government of India, on September 11, 2025. The patent was granted in collaboration with her team members—Tribeni Saitika, Mrs. Alaka Gogoi, Swarnimata Choudhary, and Dibakar Bordoloi. The innovation is a self-learning digital interface machine designed to enhance modern educational practices. This achievement marks a significant contribution to the field of educational technology and highlights the growing research and innovation initiatives at Moran College.

**International Recognition and Research Advancement**  
Ms. Ankita Purkayastha, Assistant Professor in the Department of Botany at Moran College, has been awarded a "Second Best Presenter Award" at a Two-Day International Symposium on Science, Sustainability, and Advancements in the Natural World, held from March 27-29, 2025, in Goa, organized by DIT-IFT-IBH, Nanda Nath Saikia College in collaboration with national and international institutions. She witnessed participation from researchers across the globe. She was recognized for her oral presentation titled "Decoding the Resistance Reservoir: Innovative Surveillance of Ethna-Motard MRD Cinnabarinoyl for Sustainable Healthcare Environments" which addresses key challenges in antimicrobial resistance and sustainable healthcare.

**Eco Club continues AVEP Series; proceeds with insightful Second Session**  
The Eco Club, Moran College, in collaboration with the Environment & Climate Cell and the Department of Botany under the aegis of IQAC, organized a One-day State-Level Online Orientation-cum-Popular Talk under the AVEP Valley Education Programme (AVEP), aimed at promoting academic interaction and collaboration between the two values of Assam. The highlight of the programme was a talk on "Conservation of Orchids: Preserving Nature's Delicate Treasures" by Khyanjyoti Gogoi, the orchid man of Assam.
